The kinds of Special Educational Needs for which provision is made at the school	What kinds of SEND do pupils have in your school?	<p>Children are identified as having SEND when they have a significantly greater difficulty in learning than the majority of children the same age.</p> <p>At The Earls High School we support students in the four broad areas of SEND:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Communication and Interaction. • Cognition and Learning. • Social, Emotional and Mental Health difficulties. • Sensory or Physical difficulties.

		<p>evaluations are used to create and implement improvement plans and interventions for all aspects of school life.</p> <p>Termly reports are given to the school's 'Local Governing Body' and governors therefore have the opportunity to review and evaluate the school's SEN provision.</p>

The school's arrangements for assessing and reviewing the progress of pupils with special educational needs</p>	<p>How do you check and review the progress of my child and how will I be involved?</p>	<p>The school will send home either progress or full reports each year which will show your child's current and target levels as well as reporting on their effort, behaviour and homework.</p> <p>Faculty Directors, Curriculum Leaders, Heads of School and special needs staff will monitor and review your child's levels and pick up on any subjects where your child is not making the right amount of progress.</p> <p>Intervention is then put in place, initially by the subject teacher. At the next reporting time we will check whether appropriate progress has been made.</p> <p>We welcome the involvement of parents/carers and want to keep you up to date and involved with your child's progress. We do this through parents' evenings; Class Charts; email; telephone calls; appointments made with individual teachers; Annual Reviews (for those on the SEND register).</p> <p>The school provides information for parents through newsletters; information on the website; Open/Information days; Parents Evenings and letters home.</p>

The school's approach to teaching pupils with special educational needs</p>	<p>How do teachers help pupils with SEND?</p>	<p>Our teachers have high expectations of all students, including those with SEND. Teaching staff will be informed about your child's individual needs and have experience and/or are appropriately trained to adapt their lessons to meet these requirements. This may involve using different strategies and more practical adaptation of resources and activities, with the aim that your child can access the lessons fully.</p> <p>Within school there are a variety of staff roles to help us fully support your child. Where it is felt it is the right thing to do a student may be offered additional help and support, in which case you would be informed. There are a range of interventions and additional subject support which are available.</p> <p>When your child is approaching the start of Key Stage 4, if we think it is needed, we will assess and apply for exam access arrangements according to the Joint Council for Qualifications exam regulations.</p>

How the school adapts the curriculum and learning environment for pupils with special educational needs</p>	<p>How will the curriculum be matched to my child's needs?</p> <p>How accessible is the school environment?</p>	<p>All of our students follow our broad and balanced curriculum. Some students will need additional support in accessing it.</p> <p>Our school is a safe and accessible building, and we do our best to make it welcoming to the whole community. All safeguarding procedures and risk assessments are in place and adhered to by staff.</p> <p>We have a range of different facilities to help SEND students throughout our school including a number of lifts, a disabled toilet, ramps in some areas and where access to classrooms is not possible by wheelchair, the room timetable is modified to ensure that students can access the entire curriculum.</p>

Additional support for learning that is available to pupils with special educational needs</p>	<p>Is there additional support available to help pupils with SEND with their learning?</p> <p>How are the school's resources allocated and matched to children's special educational needs?</p> <p>How is the decision made about how much/what support my child will receive?</p>	<p>The first wave of support provided for students with special needs is via high quality teaching. Where appropriate we also use teaching assistants and provide further support through the Heads of Year/School, the SENCo and the SEN Managers.</p> <p>Resources are allocated based on evidence of need and effectiveness.</p> <p>Students with an EHCP have resources allocated as outlined in their plan. Teaching Assistants are allocated, where resources allow, to support students in lessons. Staff liaise closely with them to ensure maximum effectiveness. They have a huge range of skills to offer in supporting students directly and indirectly, assisting staff and helping parents/carers.</p> <p>Students with EHCP's will have targets and strategies set by the Learning Support team. Annual reviews involving the student, parents/ carers, subject staff and other professionals evaluate those targets and strategies. The decision is based on evidence of need and impact.</p>

How the school enables pupils with special educational needs to engage in the activities of the school (including physical activities) together with children who do not have special educational needs</p>	<p>What social, before and after school, and other activities are available for pupils with SEND?</p> <p>How can my child and I find out about these activities?</p>	<p>A large range of academic, sporting and other extra-curricular clubs are available at The Earls High School. These are open to all students, including students with SEND.</p> <p>Additionally, we run a range of activities to support SEND students including a Homework Club and other targeted support before and after school and at lunchtimes.</p> <p>The Extra-Curricular activities list is available on the school's website. SEND Clubs are advertised to students through the learning support base.</p>

	<p>How will my child be included in activities outside the classroom, including school trips?</p>	<p>All children in the school are encouraged to take part in extra activities at break time, lunchtime and after school. Day and residential trips are open to all children and your child's specific needs can be discussed if they wish to join such a trip.</p>

Support that is available for improving the emotional, mental and social development of pupils with special educational needs</p>	<p>What support will there be for my child's overall well-being?</p>	<p>At The Earls High School, we take our pastoral responsibilities seriously. We pride ourselves on providing a high level of student support and guidance. One way we support our students is by assigning them to a form tutor who will (where possible) remain with them as they progress up the school. This provides continuity and builds a strong relationship between tutor and students.</p> <p>There are additional members of staff who are able to provide pastoral support, these include: The Heads of Year, Heads of School, the SENCo, the SEN Managers and Learning mentors. We also liaise with a number of external agencies for example: Speech and language team, Autism outreach, C.A.H.M.S. and the Hearing Impairment service.</p>

Information about the expertise and training of staff in relation to children and young people with special educational needs and about how specialist expertise will be secured</p>	<p>What training have the staff supporting children and young people with SEND had or are having?</p>	<p>We have a Learning Support department which is made up of the SENCo, 2 SEN Managers, and a team of teaching assistants. Within this team we have staff who have a range of experience and training, covering various SEN needs including the National SENCo. Qualification; NVQ Level 2 qualifications, Behaviour Support; Supporting students with ASD; Supporting students with ADHD; Attachment Issues, Access arrangements, Oral Language Modifier, Child Protection, First Aid, reading recovery, support of students with physical and sensory difficulties, speech and language difficulties, social emotional and mental health difficulties. Training is provided to all staff, including teachers and TA's, as the need arises as well as opportunities to further develop skills. Staff who are new to the school follow an induction programme which includes training and information on SEN.</p> <p>As a school we can call on support from specialist organisations from within the Local Authority as well as Health and Social Care Services.</p>

Information about how equipment and facilities to support children and young people with special educational needs will be secured</p>	<p>What happens if my child needs specialist equipment or other facilities?</p>	<p>As a school we can access a range of services including the Visual and Hearing Impaired Team & Physical Impairment Service. These services are contacted when necessary and appropriate, according to your child's needs. If you believe your child needs specialist equipment or other facilities please contact Mr Berry.</p>

The arrangements for consulting parents of children with special educational needs about, and involving such parents in, the education of their child.</p>	<p>How will I be involved in discussions about and planning for my child's education?</p>	<p>We need you to support us and your child by encouraging them to fully engage with their learning and any interventions offered by:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Helping them to be organised for their day (including bringing the right equipment and books). • Full attendance and good punctuality. • Completion of homework. • Checking and signing planner. • Attending parents' meetings. • Attending any meetings specifically arranged for your child.

The arrangements for consulting young people with special educational needs about, and involving them in, their education</p>	<p>How will my child be involved in his/her own learning and decisions made about his/her education?</p>	<p>Students are encouraged to take part in 'student voice' activities; to regularly evaluate their work in lessons and consider their attainment, progress and next steps for improvement. They also attend review meetings; contribute to target setting and reviewing and reflect on their learning and achievements by completing 'About me – views and aspirations' documents prior to reviews.</p>

The school's arrangements for supporting pupils with special educational needs in a transfer between phases of education or in preparation for adulthood and independent living</p>	<p>How will the school prepare and support my child when joining your school or transferring to a new school or post-16 provision?</p>	<p>We liaise closely with primary schools and provide additional transition support both before your child starts and afterwards, if it is needed.</p> <p>We provide additional support and guidance to students and parents during the year 9 options process to ensure that they make appropriate subject choices for their KS4 courses.</p> <p>All children receive advice on careers and are encouraged to visit colleges to explore post-16 courses. If additional support is needed this will be put in place. We work closely with Connexions to ensure relevant paperwork is completed for students with EHCPs.</p>
