

#### KS3 Curriculum overview: Drama

### Why do we study Drama at The Earls High School?

- Drama teaches and explores skills that employers are looking for: independence, problem solving, teamwork, creative thinking, presentation and communication skills, organisational skills = SUCCESSFUL CITIZENS.
- The ethos of the department is one of tolerance and mutual respect, everyone is valued for their contribution. Pupils are expected to work hard; staff have high expectations of pupils.
- To develop acting skills to communicate meaning and explore a range of scenarios and contexts.
- To expand pupils' cultural knowledge and experiences.
- To provide opportunities to allow students to 'put themselves in someone else's shoes'.
- To allow students to strive to make and enjoy theatre that is inspiring, challenging and entertaining.

Autumn / Spring Term	Spring / Summer Term
Unit 1: DEVISED: 'Introduction to Drama: War of the Worlds'	Unit 2: SCRIPTED: 'Ernie's Incredible Illucinations'
To learn about: Teaching students introductory Drama skills and stagecraft through devising, in order to prepare them for a baseline assessment, and a final practical assessment. The focus of this unit will be on physical theatre and ensemble work.  Main home learning tasks:  Practical Task: To rehearse performance (assessment) in groups.  Key assessment:  Groups will be given a stimulus (The War of the Worlds) and will be required to create a performance using this as their starting point. They will be expected to work collaboratively during rehearsals and performance work.  Assessment conditions:  Group rehearsals and performance; individually assessed.	To learn about: Pupils learn about characterisation through the study of Alan Ayckbourn's 'Ernie's Incredible Illucinations'. Pupils explore the process of bringing a script from page to stage.  Main home learning tasks: Practical Task: To rehearse performance (assessment) in groups. Reading Task: To learn lines for assessment performance.  Key assessment: Groups perform an extract of the script focusing on characterisation.  Assessment conditions: Group rehearsals and performance; individually assessed.

Unit 1: DEVISED: 'Silent Movies'	Unit 2: SCRIPTED: 'James and the Giant Peach'
To learn about: Pupils learn about silent comedy through performance-studying the iconic Charlie Chaplin and Rowan Atkinson.  Main home learning tasks: Practical Task: To rehearse performance (assessment) in groups. Writing Task: Charlie Chaplin research task.  Key assessment: Pupils to create their own silent comedy including; caption, slapstick comedy, music and mime using the performance title of 'The Worst Spies Ever'.  Assessment conditions: Group rehearsals and performance; individually assessed.	To learn about: Pupils learn about physical characterisation through study of Roald Dahl's 'James and the Giant Peach' (adapted by Michael Wood). Pupils explore the process of bringing a script from page to stage.  Main home learning tasks: Practical Task: To rehearse performance (assessment) in groups. Reading Task: To learn lines for assessment performance. Written Task: Revision in preparation for theoretical test.  Key assessment: Groups perform an extract of the script focusing on characterisation. Written test based on knowledge of play script.  Assessment conditions: Group rehearsals and performance; individually assessed
